BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS REPORT



The oldest tree on the Castle grounds, a weeping mulberry, suffered severe damage during high winds and sustained an injury that we worried would require us to cut it down. Phil Pierce, our Castle Arborist, to the rescue! Phil propped it up and we should be able to appreciate it for a few more years.

Fall cleanup involved our wonderful board members, Sharon McGill and Ron Crampton, with the help of our dedicated master gardeners, Castle staff, and other volunteers to prepare the property for winter. According to weather forecasters we are in for a snowier than usual and colder than usual winter, so we're prepared for the season. The summer splendor is past and we are all hunkering down for the winter.

There is still a festive look, however, provided by the Joslyn Castle Neighborhood Association who each year provides us with a set of holiday evergreens to be featured during its annual tree lighting ceremony, which happened December 4. We welcome everyone to visit the grounds during December to see the decorations.

Inside the Castle is spectacular as well as being warm and cozy. Holiday decorations abound, and we have many projects in the works to aid in restoration and appearance. Debbie Nelson has done some more painting—specifically George Joslyn's office and the bride's room. Mark Williamson of the WoodMark Group has been working on the window sills and the piano top, and will tackle our historic dining room table next.

Trevor King, Director of Buildings and Grounds, resurfaced the back steps and knee walls and our next project is restoring the Davenport Street entrance steps leading up to the Castle. Part of our Summer Fete was devoted to a "Raise the Paddle" fundraiser for these steps which is a large restoration. While we have raised part of the cost, there is still a way to go to finance the entire project.



Summer Fete









The challenge was simple: Party Like a Joslyn. Over 150 Summer Fete guests on a beautiful August evening ensured we achieved our goal.

The 2017 Joslyn Castle Summer Fete was designed to pay tribute to the original Fete hosted by George and Sarah Joslyn exactly 120 years prior on their newly-completed estate grounds. The Castle was not yet standing (it wouldn't be finished until six years later in 1903), but the 5.57 acre grounds proved a spectacular setting for the property's big debut in the community.

Guests of the 2017 Summer Fete were encouraged to embrace the theme and don traditional garden party attire, and we were pleased how many guests were sporting seersucker and lawn dresses. Guests enjoyed many of the same activities as the original revelers including tarot card readings, Russian tea tasting (provided by The Tea Smith), and traditional lawn games like badminton and croquet. Local violinists and a cellist stationed throughout the grounds performed in the glow of dozens of paper lanterns hung from the trees, creating an elegant backdrop.

Inside the Castle, guests were invited to explore the Joslyns' home, including George's rarely-seen man-cave basement and third floor turrets. Ragtime tunes floated throughout the rooms thanks to Dan McCarthy expertly playing our recently restored 1864 Chickering square piano.

Dinner was served under a white tent with white linens – much like the way the Joslyns' hosted their event in 1897. The feast began with a strawberry feta salad, and was followed by the main course of grilled margarita chicken with a mango salsa, and grilled summer vegetables with fingerling potatoes. The meal ended on a sweet note with a chocolate peppermint with a gilded Joslyn Castle logo.

During the meal, honorary event chairman Brad Ashford welcomed guests and recalled the history of saving the Castle from demolition in the early 1990's. With the challenge to "Save the Steps," guests raised their paddles, generously pledging over \$20,000 in support of the Castle's Davenport street entrance steps restoration projects. All told, our first (modern) Summer Fete raised over \$80,000 for the preservation and restoration of our historic treasure.

The staff and Summer Fete planning committee would like to extend our deepest gratitude to the sponsors, patrons, volunteers, and community partners who ensured the 2017 Summer Fete was a success.

2017 JOSLYN CASTLE ARTS AND LITERARY FESTIVAL FROM SARAH JOSLYN COMES A CELEBRATION OF NEBRASKA'S WOMEN







One of the most beloved traditions at the Joslyn Castle is our annual Art and Literary Festival. In 2017, we celebrated another successful weeklong festival of literature, art, music, theatre, and poetry within the Castle walls.

This year's festival honored Sarah Joslyn's legacy by celebrating Nebraska women. With such an amazing talent pool to choose from, it wasn't difficult to gather the finest artists, poets, musicians, authors, and thespians Nebraska has to offer.

The Festival kicked off with a poetry workshop led by Nebraska State Poet Twyla Hansen for high school students from Central High and Marian High. Other student events included a book reading and signing by 17-year-old author Taryn Smith, a senior at Millard South. Ms. Smith discussed her book *Nevertheless*, *She Persisted* with middle-school girls from Completely Kids' afterschool program. After asking Taryn questions about writing and her inspirations, each girl received a signed copy of the book to take home.

Other literary events included a discussion led by local author Eileen Wirth about Nebraska's women in journalism, which was told with many personal stories from her time in the *Omaha World-Herald* newsroom. Attorney and writer Sally Bisson-Best also regaled history lovers with tales of Doris Stevens of Omaha, a little-known leader in the suffragist movement. And finally, the Omaha Public Library hosted a book club featuring author Barbara Eymann Mohrman, sharing her book *Four Blue Stars in the Window*.

Music was a huge part of Sarah and George Joslyn's life, and we were excited to feature local musical talent in their home once again. Anne Nagosky, who owns one of the largest private studios in Omaha, led a performance of her violin and viola students who ranged in age from 5-17 years-old. A packed audience in the library consisted primarily of proud parents and grandparents who were thrilled to see their little virtuosos perform in such a historic, unique space.

A new partnership with Benson Femme Fest had the Castle's Music Room rocking! The music performed during the festival culminated in an evening entirely dedicated to local musicians, "A Showcase of Women Who Rock." Local performers included Edem Soul Music, All Young Girls Are Machine Guns, Nat Budz, and many more.

We were honored to feature Nebraska Shakespeare's "Juno's Swans," an all-female performance group, who remounted scenes from their popular *Richard 3*, after completing a successful run at the Blue Barn Theatre. After the performance, the cast led a discussion with audience members about gender roles and identity in Shakespeare's works.

Providing the backdrop to all this amazing literary art, music, and theatre were fantastic artworks displayed throughout the Castle. Local Omaha native Judith Welk displayed a collection of her pieces inspired by her home: the historic Dundee neighborhood. And, in a repeat appearance, the Museum of Nebraska Art (MONA) curated artworks from female artists spanning centuries and many mediums.

For the first time the Joslyn Castle partnered with The Union for Contemporary Art. The Union and girls ranging in age from 8-12 years-old from Girls, Inc., created a stunning collaborative textile mural in the style of Lincoln's Nancy Friedemann Sanchez. The mural contained screen prints from vintage textiles and words of literary inspiration throughout. It looked fantastic hanging in the Gold Room for the duration of the Festival. Another highlight was an unveiling of Tom Kerr's new portrait of Sarah Joslyn. It is a partner for the portrait he did last year of George Joslyn for the 100th anniversary of his death.

Thank you to our many community partners and volunteers for offering their time and talents to create impactful, important, programming. Of course, a festival of this magnitude cannot happen without the support of our local arts champions. A special thank you to our sponsors Humanities Nebraska, the Nebraska Arts Council, The Giger Foundation, and members of the Joslyn Castle board of directors for providing financial support for the Festival.

As always, our goal was to honor the legacies of George and Sarah Joslyn and their belief that whether you wore overalls or a suit and tie, everyone deserves access to culture and arts.

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A RENTAL STORY UNLIKE MOST

On August 28th, David and Jennifer Hancock, of Bellevue, spent an evening with family and friends at the Joslyn Castle to celebrate the adoption of their three daughters – Ruby (6), Grace (5), and Kate (1). For the Hancocks, this event represented the happy resolution of a much-deferred foster case and an affirmation of the special place each girl has to keep in their family.



Ruby, the oldest child, came into the Hancocks' home in 2012 as a one-year-old toddler, shortly after David and Jennifer became certified for foster parenting. Two months later Grace arrived – straight out of the hospital at four days old. Ruby and Grace are biological sisters, and have been very close. While the Hancocks supported efforts to reunite the children with their biological parents, they were also offering foster care to adoption. The importance of permanency for the children grew over the long course of their foster case. As David and Jennifer raised the girls, they also developed relationships with the biological parents. Ultimately, in the best interest of the children, a mutual decision was made for their adoption in place. After this decision was percolated through the legal system, Ruby and Grace were finally adopted in August 2017.

In the meantime, little Katie was born to the Hancocks in 2016 – also an adopted child. Katie was adopted as an embryo, and although she is genetically unrelated, Jennifer was able to carry and deliver the baby. Today there are over 700,000 frozen embryos in the United States available for adoption, and waiting for the chance to be born. After learning this, David and Jennifer worked with the Child Saving Institute in preparation for another adoption, and received the embryo transfer in 2015.

The older girls' surnames were changed with their legal adoption from foster care, but they had begun using them much earlier. Anticipating this change, the Hancocks gave them "princess names" to use during their dress-up and playtime – "Princess Ruby" and "Princess Grace." Before long, they claimed these names for themselves, and began to use them everywhere.

Rather than downplay the girls' adoption as an overdue formality, the Hancocks decided to make a royal event of it, as an opportunity to affirm and establish the girls. "We want them to know that they are loved, that they are wanted, and that they belong right where they are. We plan to celebrate the kids' adoption day just as regularly as their birthdays, so it was important to mark the original occasion with a special party." David and Jennifer were joined by their family and church friends at Joslyn Castle for the "Adoption Coronation." There, in royal fashion, the girls were crowned as princesses and presented as members of the Hancock family. With music, dancing, visiting, and family photos, the Castle was a perfect setting for this occasion. It is even more fitting, considering George and Sarah Joslyn's own involvement with the Child Saving Institute and the adoption of their daughter Violet.


